My dear Mr. de László.

With regard to the enclosed account - somewhat belated I fear, after Mr. de László's request! - I want you to know that it is for 3 years "professional attendance" on the family - and that I have not made any charges for visiting you at the Nursing Home. I can only consider it an honour to have had that privilege, and to have helped, in however small a way, to alleviate the sufferings of so distinguished an Artist. I have felt so acutely the disgrace of our Government's action with regard to their treatment of you, that as an Englishman

I should like to feel that I have done something towards wiping out the stain & stigma of that treatment.

This is baldly put, but I hope you will understand -

I should like to have seen you at Tom Courty Seat - but I have been exceedingly busy ever since Christmas.

Now, is there any chance of your being able to do a black & white portrait of a friend of mine in the near future? His wife is so taken with your sketch of me, that she wants one done of her husband. He is a very clever man - & has a head you would do justice to. (By the way he is the man who ~~has~~ translated your book into French just before the war.) How could this be managed?

Please give my kindest regards to your wife & with every good wish to yourself.
