Nothing could describe the splendour of the mediaeval ceremony,

one can only say it was glorious, and more wonderful still was the expressions of loyalty on the part of the millions who were in London then.

You too must have had very interesting days during the visit of the King and Queen of Italy. It was certainly an historic event for Hungary, I think centuries must have passed since such a thing took place in its Capital. I much hope it will be to the great advantage of Hungary in her present unfortunate position.

Now, dear friend, I cannot wait longer before giving you our future programme. I do ho e you will understand the situation. I must not do anything to tire myself too much, as I have many important works waiting, and others I have to refuse.

I will write to that effect to our friend Dr.

Légrédy too, and ho e he will be able to come with you.

I could then arrange that you could take the picture back with you, and so avoid complications. I am looking forward to hearing from you.
