They should consider, however, whether it was not still the duty of England to send out her very best, as she had done in the past, to the task that India could present to an ambitious man. It was a very difficult task just now, much more difficult, probably, than it had been for a hundred years, but there was no need to challenge them to difficult tasks, and he hoped some would come forward to prevent failure in India, because failure must come unless Englishmen were ready still to guide-perhaps not quite in the same way as they had guided in the past—the destinies of India until she was more able than at present to guide
