REPRESENTATIVE SCOTTISH WORKS.

PERTH is one of the Scottish towns over a long series of years interest in art has been kept alive by means of periodical exhibitions. Another exhibition, under the auspices of the Perthshire Art Association, is to be opened to the public in the Sandeman Public Library to-day. The promoters are considerably handicapped by the lack of adequate accommodation. The most has been made of the facilities; but some unavoidable features of the exhibition—an effect of orowding, the impossibility of symmetrical arrangement, and difficulties of hanging old loan pictures and modern work harmoniously—suggest that the and modern work harmoniously—suggest that the provision by some means of a gallery in which exhibitions of the kind might be more effectively

exhibitions of the kind might be more entered is now overdue.

The exhibition is of a fairly representative character, and comprises 150 exhibits, including some interesting loan pictures. It is contributed to by well-known painters of Edinburgh and Glasgow, and also affords an opportunity to local artists to display their work. Anongst the notable loan three portraits by P. de Lazzlo, two display their work. Amongst the notable loan pictures are three portraits by P. de Lazzlo, two of them lent by Lord Forteviot, being portraits of Lady Forteviot, a full length, seated, and the Hon. John Dewar, Lord Provost of Perth. The third is a portrait of Mrs J. M. Fraser, marked by suavity and verve in the rendering of the grey draperies. It is lent by Mr J. M. Fraser of Invermay. Occupying the centre of one of the end walls is the well-known picture by Blommers, "The Young-Navigators," which is lent by Mr A. T. Reid. Other loan pictures include a fine still life, "Peaches," by Gustave Courbet, and a pastel, "Le Reid. Sir D. Y. Cameron's "A Castle on the North Sea," rich in colour, with the warmly toned masonry shown against a dark blue sea, is classic in feeling. There is a distinctly personal note also in "The Evening of the Fete," by D. M. Sutherland, A.R.S.A., with its decorative, glowing globes in mid-air: The "Hardy Scots" of George Smith, R.S.A., are caravan ponies in a snowy landscape. There is a sweeping gesture, a sense of elemental movement, in "Hills of Atholl," by W. M. Frazer, R.S.A. In "Prestonkirk, East Linton," Robert Hope, R.S.A., exhibits for the first time as an Academician. "Desert Robbers." by J. Sydney Steel, Perth, a band of Arabs crossing a shallow patch of water in the moonlight, as imaginative quality and feeling. Mr Steel also shows a large still life. Malcolm Gavin, A.R.S.A., sends an attractive portrait of a lady, n which the purple headdress is the keynote. Mr femmell Hutchison, R.S.A., shows a characteristic igure picture, full of sun/ and wind, "A Good Drying Day." There is also an exhilarating sense of the open-air in J. G. Spence Smith's "Highand Croft, near Dalmally." "Roberta," a striking figure picture, was recently shown in Edinburgh, Archibald Kay, A.R.S.A., is in familiar vein in his andscape, "In Far Lochaber," as is R. B. Nisbet, A.S.A., in "Locking Towards Dundee: Sunset." William Walls, R.S.A., presents a happy group of tound and puppies in "Cares and Caresses." Mr W. S. MacGeorge, R.S.A., renders autumn colours lecoratively in "Beech Woods in October." There is good distance in W. Hamilton Pitkeathly's "Landscape."
