Marriage to Mr. Dawnay

LORD WATERFORD GIVES AWAY HIS SISTER

The Marquess of Waterford gave away his sister, Lady Katherine Nora Beresford, at her marriage yesterday to Mr. David Dawnay, of the 10th Royal Hussars (Prince of Wales's Own). The bride is the second daughter of the late Marquess of Waterford and of Lady Osborne Beauclerk, and granddaughter of the Marquess and Marchioness of Lansdowne. The bridegroom is the eldest son of the late Major the Hon. Hugh Dawnay and of Lady Susan Dawnay, of Whitfield Court, County Waterford.

The ceremony took place at St. John's Church, Southwick-crescent. N.C.O.'s of the bridegroom's regiment formed a guard of honour, and on the arrival of the bride presented her with a sheaf of white lilies tied with the regimental colours. The Bishop of Cashel performed the rite, assisted by the Archdeacon of Waterford and the Rev. A. S. Blunt, the vicar of St. John's.

TRAIN OF EXQUISITE LACE

The bride's dainty dress of ivory georgette was embroidered with pearls and crystals in horizontal lines and was finished at one side with a long scarf drapery. The train of exquisite old Brussels lace (lent by Lady Susan Dawnay and Lady Clodagh Anson) was mounted on blush-pink chiffon, and her veil of white silk tulle was held by a deep bandeau of pearls and brilliants, with tufts of orange flowers over the ears. The page wore short satin knickers in bois-de-rose colour, with a soft georgette shirt to match, and the little maid's frock was of the same coloured georgette. The bridesmaids' dresses were of lace, shading from deep russet-red at the hem to cream at the shoulders, and were embroidered in silver and girdled with autumn leaves. Similar leaves were used for their head wreaths and they carried sheaves of chrysanthemums toning with their dresses. Mr William Baird, a brother officer of the bridegroom, was best man.
