

Anglo-Persian Petroleum Company; £5,000, instalment of a collection among the members of Lloyd's; £1,050 from the Stock Exchange (first instalment); £1,000 each from the great banks, City trading companies, and private donors, some of whom remain anonymous.

The first list of donations contained a donation of £1,000 as from Messrs. Ralli Brothers, whereas the cheque was sent in fact on behalf of the senior partner of that firm, Sir Lucas Ralli, and should, of course, have been attributed to him personally. Writing to point out the mistake, Sir Lucas Ralli says that his partners and himself have decided to allow the first £1,000 to stand as coming from the firm, and that he himself is sending a second £1,000 on his own account.

Mr. Philip de Laszlo, the well-known portrait-painter, proposes a scheme for enlisting his fellow-artists in aid of the Fund. He writes:—

I have just read in *The Times* of your splendid idea to appeal to the nation to create a National Fund for the Police Force, who stood by so loyally in the dangerous days we are emerging from. We heartily sympathize with your suggestion, and I should be happy to add to the Fund by offering a blank canvas, in the sense as arranged by the Red Cross during the war, to which I contributed portraits several times. The size of the canvas would be 30in. by 40in., to be auctioned at Christie's or through the columns of *The Times*. It would be very nice if other colleagues would give canvases also.

It is notable how many contributions, and what enthusiastic letters, come from special

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
