Greet, who played Mistress Quickly, and Miss Olga Lindo, Doll Tearsheet, were in the cast. Falstaff was played by Mr. R. W. Speaight, who, it is said, put himself in strict training in order to acquire some approach to Falstaff's mighty girth.

Mr. Philip de Laszlo, the son of the famous portrait painter, played the part of the Lord Chief Justice. The Hon. D. Buckley, Mr. M. A. E. Franklin, Mr. H. Prisewood, and Mr. H. S. Barnes, were

all competent in their parts.
