Dear Mr. Wills,

I have noted the contents of your letter of the 7th instant, and hope very much that in about two months time you will kindly arrange for the floor in the studio to be put in good order.

I wish also to let you know that no-one has yet arrived to do the work in connection with the woodwork on the columns in the garden, and I would like to have this work done soon.

Today, Messrs White's representative called, and I explained to him what I wished to have done. I simply want removing the two lower bunches of flowers, and two long narrow ribbons hung instead, and I showed him this in a small drawing. I was rather astonished when he said that the cost for carrying out this small work would be £5, and I do not feel inclined to pay this amount, as in the first place when I was shewn the drawings I objected then to the bunches of flowers and did not want them put in, also as Messrs White's are going to take away the flowers, he ought to give in exchange the ribbons.

No doubt before Messrs White act, they will be communicating with you, and I shall be glad if you can satisfactorily arrange this matter.

I have today forwarded to Messrs White's a cheque for £423. 15. 0, in accordance with your certificate.

I enclose you cheque for £75. 10. 0 for your honorarium, and thank you very much for all the trouble and interest you have taken in this work.
